PROGRAMS IN OPERATION,

There are many Neighborhood Watch Programs in operation throughout the Nation. As you will notice, the program outlined here differs primarily in that it emphasizes the WIN-WIN-WIN potential between Local Businesses, Government, and Residents.

Of course, any program that reduces crime, and is a community effort has a great deal of knowledge and experience to share. In this section we have compiled a list of several different Neighborhood Watch programs that incorporate the idea of mobile patrolling into the plan design.

- Salt Lake City, Utah The Crime Prevention unit for the Salt Lake County Sheriff's Office
 includes a Neighborhood Watch and Mobile Watch program. Their project works in
 coordination with the Neighborhood Watch program; citizens patrol their own
 neighborhood at night on short one-hour shifts. Visit their website for further information:

- Provo, Utah -This Mobile Watch recruits volunteers from residents, and members go out on evening patrols in 4 hour shifts. Their dedication has paid off. In it's first year, in the neighborhood of Rivergrove, theft, burglary and drug activity decreased 30%. Visit their website for further information: http://provomw.homestead.com/home.html.
- San Diego, California Community members in the Rolando Village neighborhood use their own vehicles to patrol in the evenings. - Maywood, California In pairs, these community volunteers patrol designated "volunteer areas", driving a volunteer patrol cars, and wear uniforms.  program, called Citizens Law Enforcement Network U and Police (CLEAN-UP), enlists

 businesses which volunteer to participate are provided with training on how to report
